She then proceeded to show her family how to scrub 'clothing' on a scrub board in a wash tub, put it through the wringer, and hang it on the drying rack with clothespins to dry. Other activities at the Children's Hands - On Activities Tent included Farm Tools, Mattress Stuffing, 'Game of Graces', Artifact Challenge, Print Shop and Art Activities. All the families seemed to thoroughly enjoy exploring the village together and trying the activities as they experienced living in the past.

Since Log Cabin Days we have had a big increase in visitors on Wednesdays during the daytime from 10:30 am to 2 pm and also during the summer visiting hours from 4 to 8 pm. We are very excited about all the new interest in our Historical Village. Come see us soon!

## Chronicle Points Out 1958 Events

### Lakeland Tribune, 1958

*The following are excerpts from an article printed in the Lakeland Tribune highlighting important events in 1958.*

#### January

The first week in January provided some relief from the "water hole" on the Dixie Highway just east of Williams Lake Road-Walton Blvd. intersection as Oakland County Drain Commissioner Daniel Barry announced that work to correct this situation was nearly completed as lines to the extension drain had been unplugged and new corrugated drain pipes laid.

The following week, Harold H. Keith, a branch manager of the Pontiac State Bank, was named as the "Young Man of the Year for 1957" in the annual contest sponsored by the Jaycees.

Plans and specifications for the new Thomas Cooley Elementary School were approved during the third week of the year and the go ahead sign given for the new building on the north side of Watkins Lake.

The trend of suburban growth was evidenced when two Pontiac churches announced the last week in January that they had purchased sites in Waterford Township for the construction of new church buildings. They were Central Methodist Church, whose congregation obtained 38 acres on M-59 adjacent to Crary Junior High School, and the Lutheran Church of the Ascension, who purchased seven and nine-tenths acres on Pontiac Lake Road at Eason Street.

#### February

At the first meeting of the township board this month, Supervisor Elmer Johnson authorized to the State Highway department for a radar check of the five mile strip on the Dixie Highway from the West boulevard viaduct to the Independence Township line. The state department had just increased the speed limit there to 45 miles per hour, with which the township board did not concur, especially since patrolling of the strip was decreased due to the cut in the Township Police Department.

License plates went on sale in the Waterford Township Hall February 10 for the first time. This was the first attempt at providing such service locally for township residents and special hours were arranged to meet the needs of customers until the final day of the sale.

#### March

An alarm at 7:15 a.m., March 4, brought fire fighting equipment from Waterford and Pontiac Townships to

assist the four Independence Township trucks in extinguishing a fire at the Caribou Inn in Clarkston. Additional men from Union Lake, White Lake and Pontiac Auxiliary were needed to bring the blaze under control.

The fourth annual Waterford Township Jaycees Sports and Builders Show took place at the CAI Building the following weekend, a complete sellout as far as display space was concerned. The climax of the well attended show was the selection of Bonita Brookshear as Miss Waterford of 1958.

#### April

Captain Millard Pender was named Chief of the Waterford Township Police Department the first week in April. He had been in charge of the department with Township Supervisor Elmer Jonson acting as Chief, since former Chief, Frank Van Atta, was released in July 1957.

During the second week of April, Mrs. Robert Amos, Postmistress of the Waterford Village Post Office announced that mail carrier service would begin in the village on April 19. This is the first time residents of this area have been offered home delivery of their mail.

The final concert of the season presented by the Waterford Township Civic Music Association, featured the young American baritone James Pease on Tuesday evening, April 8. His program of widely varied selections were well received by an enthusiastic audience.

Veterans were alerted that week about a foreclosure racket operating in the township, preying on GI homeowners who are delinquent in their house payments. Some 50 homeowners in area subdivisions behind in their payments, had been approached by persons offering to purchase their equity of redemption for \$200.

#### May

In anticipation of summer patronage of Dodge Park and Cass Lake, the Township Board approved the erection of 23 "no parking" signs in Cass Lake Highlands where residents have protested public use of their property for parking by camp visitors.

The second week of May also saw the election of George Scantland as president of the Jaycees and the announcement by Lloyd L. Anderson that he would seek reelection as State Representative from district one.

Clyde Haskill, a Drayton Plains resident, was named president of the Pontiac Area Chamber of Commerce and Richard Kuhn announced that he will be a candidate again for State Senator on the Republican ticket from the twelfth district.

### June

A new Waterford Township Arbitration board was formed during the first week of June, with Paul Mandel, a Waterford Township attorney, as chairman. This board was organized to aid persons, unemployed through no fault of their own, to work out amicable settlements with their creditors during periods of temporary unemployment.

The first weekend of the month saw the annual ballet recital presented by the Waterford Township Recreation Department's Ballet Studio under the direction of Mrs. Carol Wolfe. More than 355 students participated in the two-night production.

The largest senior class was graduated from Waterford Township HS June 11 when 294 students received their diplomas. Donald Tate and Judy Boardman were class valedictorian and salutatorian, respectively.

Plans for the annual CAI Fair occupied many township folks during this month in preparation for this three-day event staged June 20-22. As part of the preparedness activity, the CAI purchased a little over an acre of property adjacent to the present parking lot to provide facilities for more cars. Nearly 15,000 persons attended the gala affair which was climaxed on Sunday evening by the crowning of Rosalie Pollina as 1858 Queen of the CAI.

### July

Elden Chew was named chief of Waterford Township

Civil Defense Auxiliary Police the first week in July, a week that also was significant for the many colorful fireworks displays produced by a number of township organizations as well as residents in celebration of Independence Day.

Jim Schell was installed as the new president of the township Lion's club and new regulations from the State Highway department advised that the speed limit on the Dixie Highway from the Pontiac limits to Waterford Hill would be 40 miles per hour, effective July 21.

The township Recreation board discussed and gave final approval to the Recreation Department's budget of \$25,437.40 for the fiscal year 1958-59 and feature publicity was given the recently organized Oakland County Sheriff Department's Water Patrol who have been doing an outstanding job of making township and county lakes safer this summer.

Notable event of the third week in July was the grand opening of the new S.S. Kresge store in the Drayton Shopping Center. Township Supervisor Elmer Johnson cut the ribbon with gold scissors for the event which was attended by many company dignitaries, including Stanley S. Kresge, son of the founder.

In a report issued the last week in July, Waterford was named among the top ten communities by the Detroit Metropolitan Area Regional Planning commission for building action, with 311 permits issued during the first half of the year. The township had been out of the running in 1957.

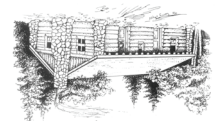
